

### Tuskegee Airman laid to rest at Arlington

Family members, friends and fellow service members gathered Jan. 20 here to honor the life and contributions of an original Tuskegee Airmen.

Retired Lt. Col. Luke Weathers, 90, a member of the 302nd Fighter Squadron during World War II, received full military honors including an F-16 Fighting Falcon flyover by 113th Wing, an Air National Guard unit of Washington, D.C. The ceremony coincided with the release of "Red Tails," a full-length feature film chronicling the challenges and victories of the Tuskegee Airmen.

"The Tuskegee Airmen were dedicated heroes who gave so much for this country," said Brig. Gen. Jeffrey Johnson, the 113th Wing commander. "It is an honor to perform a flyover for this brave American."

With World War II veterans like the Tuskegee Airmen entering their 90s, the numbers of these living history makers are dwindling.

During a time of racial segregation in America, the Tuskegee Airmen, the U.S. Army Air Corps' first black fliers, proved they were just as qualified as their white counterparts to fly in combat.

"Along with serving their country, they changed America," said retired Chief Master Sgt. John Patterson, the national 1st vice president of Tuskegee Airmen Inc. "They made it easier for me, when I came along many years later, to come into the military and have opportunities."

Weathers, a P-51 Mustang and P-39 Airacobra pilot, shot down two German planes in November 1944 and was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross for his actions. Later, in 2007, he and 300 original Tuskegee Airmen were presented with the Congressional Gold Medal. It is one of the highest awards in the United States.

## How To: Volunteer for a deployment

Making the decision to volunteer for a deployment is a big one. There are a few things you should do and must do before you will head downrange.

The first is discuss deploying with your family. Having a parent or spouse gone for an extended period can have an impact on the family. Ensure that everyone is prepared for an extended absence by contacting Family Readiness for programs available to families of deployed members. You need to make sure your family fully understands what you are volunteering for.

The next step is to obtain approval from your supervisor, unit deployment manager and commander. If approved your UDM will have you fill out a Deployment Volunteer Form.

Once the DVR is vetted, your UDM will then get in touch with the Reserve Deployment Readiness Cell, to begin searching for any available TDY's.

Air Force Reserve Command publishes deployment opportunities under the "opportunities" tab within ARCNet. You are encouraged to review this spreadsheet to get an idea of what deployment opportunities are available.

Your Career Field Functional Area Manger also has information on deployment opportunities. Work through your supervisor to contact your FAM.

If you are selected for a deployment ensure you maintain contact with your UDM at all times. Your UDM should be the first person you contact for any questions or problems related to your deployment.

If you feel you are no longer eligible to deploy because of a profile, health issues, skill level or clearance revocation, you must notify your UDM and supervisor immediately.

If you have any questions about deployment volunteering contact your squadron UDM.

## INSPECTOR GENERAL

Once an IG complaint has been made to the appropriate office it goes through the Complaints Resolution Process.

There are three phases to the CRP, all of which must be completed within 180 days of the initial complaint. Phase 1 of the CRP includes first contact and taking the complainant's information. The IG who took the complaint then has 20 days to conduct an initial analysis of the complaint and will make a decision to proceed in one of five ways. The IG may:

Transfer the case to another IG. This will happen if the subject of the complaint is in a different command than the IG receiving the complaint. This could also be the outcome here in the 477th, with the transfer going to AFRC/IG,

due to the absence of a full-

time local 477th IG.

**Assist the complainant.** This simply means the IG may be able to help the individual resolve the issue.

**Refer the complaint to a more appropriate agency**. This may include the members chain of command, EO, or JA.


**Dismiss the complaint.** If the complaint is without merit or more than 60 days after the alleged wrongdoing.

Investigate the complaint. The complaint will proceed into phase 2 (Investigation) and phase 3 (Quality Review) for this option only.

Phase 2 is limited to 64 days, and phase 3 may take up to 87 days.

#### **AROWS-R Access**

All users are reminded that once CAC access to the Air Force Reserve Orders Writing System is established, accounts cannot be switched back to the user name and password methodology. For those that are CAC-enabled, please choose the DOD CA-## certificate, and not the DOD EMAIL CA-## certificate.

**Controlled spend account:** CSA is a new travel card concept to replace the existing government travel card. The CSA program is being implemented by the regular Air Force. AFRC units will not use CSA until AFRC and SAF complete a test and implementation plan. Specific dates for AFRC implementation have not been set. Till then, AFRC units will continue to use the GTC. CSA cardholders who join reserve units will use their CSA cards and cannot revert to GTC.

**Leave on non-duty days:** For leave starting on a non-duty day, the day of departure shall be charged as a day of leave. For leave ending on a non-duty day, the day of return shall not be charged as a day of leave.
