DTS TRAVEL AUTHORIZATIONS: 477 FG travelers must not create their own travel authorizations in the Defense Travel System DTS authorizations are programmatically created after travel orders are prepared in AROWS-R.

AFTER an order is published, AROWS-R exports the authorization to DTS and sends an email to the traveler with instructions for accessing DTS and completing the authorization. This process is exclusive to all AF Reserve travelers, so our TDY travelers should ensure the email address posted in DTS is one they have ready access. Questions should be directed to unit Organizational Defense Travel Administrators.

SUPERVISORS' ROLE IN LEAVE PROCESS-

ING: 1) Ensure all parts of AF Form 988 are completed to include signatures with dates on Part I.

2) Get a leave number by submitting the AF Form 988 to the Reserve Pay Office before leave starts.

3) On the workday following member's last day of leave complete Part III certifying the leave dates that were actually taken, and submit it to the RPO.

PREPARE ORDERS IN AROWS-R: It is AFRC policy that AROWS-R will be used to prepare orders for AF reservists. All AF Forms 938, Request and Authorization for Active Duty Training/ Active Duty Tour, and DD Forms 1610, Request and Authorization for TDY Travel, must be prepared using AROWS-R. Orders should not be prepared by the active duty units to which reservists are assigned.

Civilian furloughs reduce services at 477th FG

Alaska -- Air Force Reserve personnel assigned to the 477th Fighter Group will soon see a reduction in available services during upcoming required furloughs as a result of Congressionallymandated sequestration cuts.

The 477th Fighter Group has scheduled the furlough dates for Fridays starting with July 12, 2013 through Sept. 20, 2013. However, some positions have been able to reschedule their furlough days in order to meet mission requirements.

"Our team's willingness to adjust their lives in order to minimize mission impacts, despite being furloughed, is a testament to the commitment of our Air Reserve Technician and civilian workforce." said Col. Tyler Otten, 477th Fighter Group commander. "There will be some disruptions and reductions in services. However, we all need to exercise some patience and planning during the furlough period."

All civilian employees assigned to the 477th Fighter Group will be affected by the mandated furlough; including those serving as F-22 aircrew and maintenance, financial management specialists, medical technicians as well as force support personnel.

Unit members, as well as community members requiring assistance or services from the 477th FG, such as ID card replacement or processing of personnel actions are encouraged to call ahead to verify that the services will be available. To verify that services with personnel actions will be available call 907-551-4748, to verify availability of military pay and other finance related services call 907-551-4760.

Sequestration, signed into law as part of the 2011 Budget Control Act, is a package of mandated cuts to the federal budget, totaling some \$1.2 trillion over 10 years of which some \$85 billion takes effect in fiscal 2013.

Pentagon officials originally planned to furlough employees for up to 22 days, but then reduced that number in March to 11 days following passage of a final 2013 spending bill that provided more spending flexibility.

Turkey Shoot: Bombs on target

JOINT BASE ELMENDORF-RICHARDSON, Alaska

-- A team comprised of F-22s from the 525th Fighter Squadron, Intel personnel from the 517th Airlift Squadron, Command and Control from the 962nd AACS, and a C-17 crew from the 3rd OSS took first place in the annual Turkey Shoot competition here July 15-17.

The Turkey Shoot competition provided an opportunity for four teams from multiple units within active duty 3rd Wing and the Reserve 477th Fighter Group

to face off during an offensive counter air mission scenario.

"The opportunity for our 477th Fighter Group team to work as team with other 3rd Wing airframes and crews is very valuable for us," said Col. Tyler Otten, 477th Fighter Group commander. "It provides a level of complexity and coordination that we don't have to work through on typical daily training sor-

ties. It is great training."

The biggest change to this year's competition was the addition of increment 3.1 upgrade to Alaska's Raptors adding air-to-ground targeting to what used to predominately be an air-to-air scenario.

F-22 pilot Capt. Brett Vongroven, 525th Fighter Squadron, said the competition "fostered a competitive spirit between different squadrons" and it enabled "improvement in the name of friendly competition."

Also stress tested in this competition were the maintainers, who were graded on a number of categories, including the ability to launch and recover the aircraft, the condition of their tool box, weapons proficiency, knowledge of the job and professionalism, dress and appearance. When asked what was exciting about participating in the Turkey Shoot, Senior Airman Eric Smith, 90th Aircraft Maintenance Unit, quickly responded "I like the rivalry" between the squadrons and then added "and getting a sense of why we are out here beyond launching sorties every day."

A key reason why this type of competition is so effective was that it allowed the operators and maintainers to work in a realistic threat environment while including many of the weapons systems based at JBER. Lt. Col. Chad Spellman, 3rd OSS director of operations said the "scenario was intentionally designed to be extremely challenging" and that making it a competition "puts added pressure on the members

of each team to succeed. Spellman added "as a fighter pilot, you typically don't get to conduct missions with C-17s" since most fighter bases are not colocated with cargo planes.

In total, there were four teams competing representing the 3rd OSS, 90th Fighter Squadron, 525th Fighter Squadron and the

The term "Turkey Shoot" dates back to the World War II era, during one of the most massive air battles, the "Great Marianas Turkey Shoot" or officially, the Battle of the Philippine Sea, took place. The conflict was the largest aircraft carrier battle in history, involving nearly 1,800 aircraft. Due to the ease of defending a multitude of Japanese attacks, American pilots started referring to the battle as the "turkey shoot." The battle decimated what remained of the Imperial Navy's cadre of trained pilots, and effectively eliminated Japanese carrier aviation for the duration of the war.
