



## F-22 crew chiefs play NASCAR with hot pit refuels

Jeff Gordon, Dale Earnhardt Jr., Jimmy Johnson and Danica Patrick are some of the most recognizable names in the world of NASCAR - even among the most casual sports fans. # Every Airman has a story

Turning dreams into reality

More than 20 years ago Master Sgt. Shawn Arnold joined the Air Force as a member of the security police (now security forces.)

"I grew up as a military brat," said Arnold. "At the time, both my parents were in the Marines, the military was what I knew."

Plus, according to Arnold, military duty fell in line with his desire to serve; it was a way to give back to his country. After obtaining his bachelor's degree, Arnold crossed over into the Army as an officer, but resigned his commission in 2006 to become a teacher.

"Becoming a teacher, in my mind, was very similar to my service in the military in many regards, an extension of my commitment to service," said Arnold. "And I always wanted to be a teacher; it was a way to give back locally."

### **Fiscal Fitness**

**USE YOUR LEAVE WHEN YOU ACCRUE IT:** Military leave will be scheduled and taken during the tour it was earned unless mission circumstances do not afford the member the opportunity to do so.

**TDY TRAVEL ARRIVAL/DEPARTURE DAYS:** Flights permitting, travelers should arrive no earlier than the day before the TDY begins and depart no later than one day after the TDY ends. Arriving too early or departing too late cause loss of per diem including no reimbursement for lodging cost and possible charging of leave days. Expenses for the extra days are the traveler's financial responsibility.

**SATO FEE:** The fee charged by the Scheduled Airline Ticket Office is reimbursable and should be claimed on travel vouchers. The SATO fee claim must be supported by either a receipt (usually written on the SATO itinerary) or a lost receipt form. This supporting document must be included with travel vouchers even though the amount is less than \$75.

**PREPARE ORDERS IN AROWS-R:** It is AFRC policy that AROWS-R will be used to prepare orders for AF reservists. All AF Forms 938, Request and Authorization for Active Duty Training/Active Duty Tour, and DD Forms 1610, Request and Authorization for TDY Travel, must be prepared using AROWS-R. Orders should not be prepared by the active duty units to which reservists are assigned.
