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

477th FG Implements Alternate UTA Schedule

JOINT BASE ELMENDORF-RICHARDSON, Alaska —

The 477th Fighter Group will be one of a few units that will be testing alternate unit training assembly schedules, instead of the one weekend a month and two weeks a year. The plan is to forecast and plan UTAs for: sustainability, predictability, and effectiveness.

For fiscal year 2022 there will be one virtual day per quarter, on the Sunday of UTA, to fit within the sustainable training plan. There will not be a set July UTA, it will be a liberal virtual reschedule with squadron commander's approval.

"Our sustainable training plan provided our unit a predictable forecast of when our members would be trained in a quarterly/systematic plan to avoid our entire unit coming overdue at the same time," said Col. Jonathan Gration, 477th Fighter Group commander.

The emergence of COVID-19 gave the 477th FG the opportunity to telework and apply different methods of working.

Across the 477th FG there are 42 Air Force Specialty Codes or career fields. There are areas where virtual AFSC training is possible. Currently virtual training modules are in the works. This will include e-learning that is centered on AFSCs individual Career Field Education and Training Plan.

Requirements must be forecasted and planned using DD Form 2946 Department of Defense Telework Agreement. CFETP/AFSC specific training must be highlighted for remote work.

To be successful, clear expectations must be set so Airmen are aware of what is expected from them. Everyone should be open to new communication methods and take this opportunity to foster a teamwork environment. Airmen must reflect, adjust and be flexible.

"The core piece of this is being mindful of the Airmen, being able to give them time back at some point, someway, and also building in a little bit of flexibility to their life set," said Maj. Brett Bakner, 477th Fighter Group process manager and 477th Force Support Squadron commander.

November is National American Indian Heritage Month. It is a time to celebrate the rich and diverse cultures, traditions, and histories of American Indians and Alaskan Natives, the first people of the United States. Cherokee Indian and NASA physicist, J. C. Elliott-High Eagle, authored the legislation for American Indian Awareness Week. Do you want aid in funding your degree? USAF Tuition Assistance will fund the whole or part of an undergraduate to graduate degree program. If you are interested in learning more please visit the AFVEC page. Or contact 477th Force Support Development and Education for aid in what these programs might hold for you.



Associate to Baccalaureate Cooperative (AU-ABC) directs Airmen with associate in applied science degrees from the Community College of the Air Force (CCAF) to a collection of accredited colleges and universities to consider when completing a four-year degree. The program maximizes the application of military career education and training, and provides multiple online academic and support services for the enlisted member.

SkillBridge

The SkillBridge program allows transitioning Airmen to participate in apprenticeships, internships, or on-the-job training. Eligible Airmen must be within 180 days of approved retirement or separation to start a program. Prior to submitting an application for SkillBridge, you must contact your education office to set up an appointment to discuss the program. After you meet with your education officer, you will be able to submit your application.



477th Fighter Group members in all units, if you are enrolled in CDCs there is a new learning platform that is replacing ADLS. The new platform migration is to MyLearning https://lms-jets. cce.af.mil/moodle/course/index.php?categoryid=11

The Unit Training Manager for the member will enroll them into the proper Career Development Course (CDC). Once an Airman is enrolled they will be able to access their CDC IAW CDC program that was briefed to them by their Unit Training Manager.

This Month in History NOVEMBER

Nov. 3, 1943 Twenty-nine pilots graduated from advanced pilot training at Tuskegee Army Air Field, Alabama. There were 20 single engine pilot graduates and nine were twin-engine pilots. The twin-engine aircraft pilots were the first class to graduate from advanced flight training at Tuskegee. The pilots were eventually assigned to fly medium B-25 Mitchell bombers with the 477th Bombardment Group.

Nov. 19, 1943 2nd Lt. Leon Purchase of the 302d Fighter Squadron, 332d Fighter Group died in an airplane crash eight miles northeast of Selfridge Field, Michigan.

Nov. 29, 1943 2nd Lt. William Edward Hill from the 302d FS of the 332d FG drowned in Lake Huron after parachuting from his Bell P-39 Airacobra, which had caught fire.



Nov. 2, 1944 The 302d FS emblem was approved. On a disk, it depicted a winged running red devil with a machine gun, over a cloud.

Nov. 16, 1944 332d FG pilots escorted 304th Bombardment Wing B-24 Liberator bombers to and from Munich West marshalling yards. During the mission, the group encountered several German Messerschmitt Me-109 enemy fighters that attempted to shoot down the bombers. Capt. Luke J. Weathers, a 302d Fighter Squadron pilot, shot down two enemy fighters. He earned the Distinguished Flying Cross for his actions on this day.

Nov. 21, 1980 While participating in a Red Flag exercise at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada members of the 302d Special Operations Squadron

took part in rescue operations after a fire located in the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas, Nevada. The unit received credit for saving 17 people during the course of their operations at the hotel.

Nov. 4, 2011 Lt. Col. David Piffarerio, 302d Fighter Squadron commander, became the first F-22 Raptor pilot in the world to achieve 1,000 flying hours in the aircraft. \Box

JBER Respiratory Clinic <u>OFFERS</u> COVID-19 testing for the following:

- Symptomatic testing
- Contact/exposure testing (must be first coordinated through JBER Public Health (907) 580-4014
- Official travel pre-test requirements (PCS/ ETS/TDY)
 - Official orders that state a test is needed OR international travel (*Including* members driving through Canada)
 - Tests that must be accomplished within 72 hours of *departure/arrival* depending on location
 - Results can be picked up 24 hours after test

JBER Respiratory Clinic DOES NOT OFFER COVID-19 testing for the following:

- Personal travel testing (pre or post)
 - For all non-official/personal travel testing needs, please plan on testing at the airport or visit the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services website for community travel test availability http://dhss.alaska.gov/dph/Epl/ld/ Pages/COVID-19/testing.aspx
 - Post-travel tests to curtail ROM for official travel*
